Year 10 STEM Day

On Monday 9th December, Year 10 had to get themselves into the mindset of a Pharmacist or Analytical Chemist, to try and work out if the concentration of their unknown 'Kalpol' samples would be appropriate for use.

Students built their own Colorimeters using LEDs, a simple circuit and a cuvette holder, which they built using Lego. They used this equipment and their scientific skills, to make a calibration curve, using standard solutions, which they could compare the unknowns against.

When asked what they enjoyed about the day, students said:

'Working in small groups as analytical chemists was actually really fun! We were judged on how well we worked together, how we presented our ideas, and how we explained our experiments, which made us realise how important teamwork is. It was cool because we all had to pitch in and help each other out.'

'One of the best parts was making posters about the experiments we did. It was a great way to share what we learned, and we had to make sure everything looked good and made sense. It was a fun challenge to explain science in a way that was easy to understand, but also interesting.'



One of the most interesting activities was figuring out the correct dosage of 'Kalpol', especially when we discovered that some batches had too high a concentration. I can't wait for the next STEM event!'

Students were successful in building their scientific equipment and using it to create some very good graphs. They now have a better understanding of quality control and its importance in medicines, realising that if the concentration of a drug is incorrect, it cannot be used, due to safety, or not being effective.







St John's Korogocho Update

2024 Maths - Paper Pi Prayer Chain



The Maths department have been looking to break a World Record for a while now and last year began looking towards paper chains for inspiration.

Unfortunately, the World Record was 1,000,000 links long. So, we thought we would incorporate Pi (3.1415...) and write a digit on each chain, the World Record for this was 80,000 links. We then thought of implementing our work on Catholic Social Teaching and have students write a prayer on each link, but we soon found out the World Record for a prayer chain was 57,000 links long. As a last resort, we thought a Christmas themed paper chain would win us the framed certificate, but that World Record was 45,000 links long.

Therefore, we decided to invent our own World Record and include all of the above elements! We aimed to create a paper chain that contained a digit of Pi in order, a written prayer and be Christmas themed. Last year we reached 881 links. However, after a magnificent effort from students and staff our Paper Pi Prayer Christmas Chain currently contains 2428 links and measures a colossal 175m! It took pride of place around Romero Block for the end of term festivities. It is quite a sight to see nearly two and a half thousand prayers hanging over your head each day.

We say currently as we will be looking to add to this next year, and the year after that. The only trouble is, we may run out of space to hang it up!

Year 12 Geography Field Trip

The A Level Geography exam board specification states that students must study an example of a stretch of coastline where 'hard' and 'soft' engineeringare employed to manage the coast.

This week, Year 12 students braved the elements on a visit to West Wittering, East Head, Selsey and Medmerry to explore the engineered coastlines in these destinations. Coastal managers at these locations have held the view



that the sea wall has had a detrimental impact on the beach in front of it. The reflection of waves has resulted in a scouring effect on the beach, which has left the sea wall further exposed.

The policy now employed at West Wittering is one of 'Adaptive Management', which means that managers will not 'Hold the Line'. The sea wall and the groynes are being allowed to deteriorate: the idea being that this will produce a wider, shallower beach, which will be more effective at dissipating wave energy (in theory!). The students had mixed views on this, but it is clear that they all appreciated that there is a finite pot of money available and decisions relating to coastal protection are invariably challenging.

At Selsey, hard management is still very much employed. However, just down the coast at Medmerry is a large managed realignment scheme. This is where a new 7km embankment had been built inland and the sea has been allowed to flood the land in front, thus reducing the need to use beach management strategies.

Our students will experience further field work in June when they will attend a three-day trip to Dorset to prepare them for their A Level coursework, worth 20% of their final grade.



Trips like this are not able to take place without support from my colleagues and on this occasion, I'd like to express my thanks to Mrs Quinn and Miss Jetson who accompanied the group.

This report recognises that at Oaklands, we do our very best to live out our mission statement and the Oaklands Way is one of the vehicles we use to embed our values and ethos.
